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SCAPA FLOW MUSEUM NOMINATED FOR MUSEUM OF THE YEAR AWARD



In 2022 The Scapa Flow Museum re-opened after a £4.4 million refurbishment with a grand opening in April 2023 which Olympian Sir Chris Hoy attended. The Museum was nominated for the world prestigious Museum of the Year award, with the results announced on July 12th. Although the Museum was shortlisted for the prize it was the Burrell Collection that

was declared 2023's winner. The Museum will be awarded £15,000 for being one of the four finalists, this, in itself, is a huge achievement for the team and staff of the museum and recognition for all the hard work and effort that they have put in to a Museum that everyone can be proud of. Excitingly, the museum has also been awarded the 2023 Travellers Choice Award by Trip Advisor.

The refurbishment project was achieved after 8 years of fundraising and four years of project development, including involving the children from North Walls School as consultants for the new education space. The museum is a showpiece for Hoy and it's popularity is apparent from the sheer numbers of visitors that arrive daily to enjoy the modern museum that tells the fascinating story behind the impact that both the first and second World Wars had on the island. An added bonus is the Skalpafloi café where you can round off your visit with a cuppa and a home bake or take your pick from the menu.



"I came into the project in February 2021 when the construction and internal fit-out was in full swing. There was no longer any uncertainty about its future, this was really going to happen. Being part of that decision making, when my own family connection to the building is so strong, was really special."

I was a little concerned about my lack of Wartime Orkney historical knowledge, but I realised pretty quickly that what they needed was someone who could make professional decisions about museum objects, display and content and also offer opinions on the aesthetic outcome of the building. This I felt I could do well, and am very proud of my part in how the building looks today."

My favourite aspect of the project was without any doubt, the collaboration with North Walls School. We all felt very strongly that by getting the children involved, we would be establishing an important relationship between the islanders and their museum. A relationship which would mean that Hoy folk would always feel that the Scapa Flow Museum belonged to them, as a monument to their island's story."

RNLI OPEN DAY 20TH AUGUST 2023



£874.86 raised at Lifeboat Open Day

Sunday 20 August 2023

As the morning progressed, the wind dropped and the flags and bunting fluttered lazily as the sun filtered through the light cloud cover, sparkling the peaceful sea. Stalls were busily set up, teas were brewing and the cakes, those marvellous home bakes, were ready for the off or should I say, the scoff!

At the rather busy pier, three RNLI lifeboats lay alongside each other creating a rare and unforgettable sight. How great to see all those yellow wellies brightening the scene as various lifeboat crews wandered (as opposed to the normal emergency rush) down the pier to help us celebrate our Open Day.

Once again the steadfast Longhope Lifeboat Guild, the volunteer crew, Stormy Stan and other jolly helpers made the afternoon a happy and successful fundraising event. However, this success was only made possible by the presence of all those who came down to generously support us. Thank you.

The highlight of the afternoon was the joint exercise performed by the lifeboats just off the pier. With the Y boats launched as well, the lifeboat crews carried out *man overboard* and *recovery procedures*. **It was an awesome display and we can't thank our flanking stations, RNLI Stromness and RNLI Thurso enough, for coming along.**

As the evening drifted in and the event petered out, many lingered for a while to chat by the pier, while cake fuelled children charged about on the shore. Since the pandemic these spontaneous community moments have become quite rare, so it was pleasing to strengthen the community bond, with their lifeboat station.

Finally we would like to say a special thank you to the midges, for delaying their appearance but as they say, all good things come to an end.

Our sincerest thanks to everyone involved for helping save lives at sea.

WATER SAFETY OFFICER RNLI

I have recently had the delight of accepting the role of Water Safety Officer for the Longhope Lifeboat Station. I am very much looking forward to supporting the crew in the preventative/educational side of water safety, and am particularly excited about working closely with our younger islanders towards making smart and safe decisions in and around the water which surrounds our community.

On average there are 96 water related fatalities each year in Scotland, I am proud to represent the team who devote their efforts to decreasing this in future.



It was a pleasure to be involved with Longhope Lifeboat's Open Day in the capacity of Water Safety Officer. I hoped for good engagement and very much achieved that from both adults and children alike.

The 16-01 Tamar class lifeboat colouring competition was judged by Chair of the Guild, Trish Avis, who picked out Malcolm Clark's picture as the winner, with Thorfinn Johnston a close runner up. Prizes have gone to both children, well done to all who entered!

The timed crew kit challenge drew the crowds and saw the three crews bond and cheer each other on, (with a decent amount of healthy rivalry of course), Lewis from Stromness took the lead with a cracking time of 50 seconds to get into full kit. Longhope crew, you best get practicing ahead of next year!

How long can you keep your hand in ice cold water? Do you think you could swim in water that cold? The cold water shock experiment led to some valuable conversations with a number of brave folk ranging from primary age right through to adults.

'Spot the Dangers' activities helped the children identify a variety of situations to look out for when they're in and around water, hopefully as they get older these learning outcomes stick with them and they are better equipped to deal with water related challenges.

Finally, I would like to extend a huge thank you to Scott and the Crew, the Guild, and Mary, our Press Officer, for all of the hard work that went into making the day a successful one.

THE YM

The day-to-day running of the YM was taken over by a new charity YM Empower (SC051470) known as "TheYM" 18 months ago. We have 4 Trustees and a further 32 members. Membership is free and there is no financial responsibility for the YM, but members do have the opportunity to nominate and vote for Trustees at the AGM. Our aim is to get the YM established as one of the key hubs in our community. To help us with this we have received a number of grants to date which have made it possible to restart the Lunch Club and run the Community Cafe 2 days per week. The grants to date have come from:



2022

IoHDT £7,500 for help with wages and start-up costs
OIC £6,000 to support employment of catering staff
VAO £1,000 to help with food costs for the Lunch Club
Cooke Aquaculture £1,000 to help with costs of the Christmas Meal and to buy equipment for the Parent and Toddlers Group and the Café

2023

IoHDT £10,000 for help with wages
Energy Savings Trust £3,449 for purchase of 2 e-bikes
IoHDT £1,150 match funding for purchase of 2 e-bikes

Our aim is to increase our activity with more community events so if you have ideas of what you would like us to do or want to get involved in organising some events, we'd love to hear from you. In addition to the Lunch Club and Café we now have 10 different Community Groups using the YM but we have room for more if you have an idea for something you would like to try out. We have decided to keep the hire fees for local groups at pre-covid rates so for example you can hire The Shore for up to 4 hours for £6 and the Hall for up to 4 hours for £8. 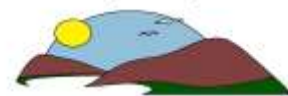

The Training and Learning Fund

Island of Hoy Development Trust



This is a fund that is open to all residents of Hoy & Walls : individuals aged 16 and under will need to get a parent/ guardian to apply on their behalf.

The fund has two main criteria that has been agreed by the board and is in line with the charitable aims of the Trust, they are:

1. To promote training, particularly among residents of the Community, and with particular reference to skills which assist the participants in obtaining paid employment.
2. To advance education and in particular to promote opportunities for learning for the benefit of the general public.

Training grants are available towards the training costs of vocational courses, development courses (including driving lessons and examinations) or for professional qualifications. Travel expenses and materials that are directly related to the course may also be applied for along with accommodation costs where it can be proven that the accommodation is necessary—please note that this does not include mileage and fuel costs.

You are also required to provide a statement on how the grant will benefit your personal development.

You can apply for up to £500 per 12 months. There is more information and details available. Please contact the Trust office for the full details.
