SCAPA FLOW MUSEUM UPDATE

Since July, our temporary exhibition in the Hoy Hotel has attracted over 1800 visitors, with lots of positive comments in the Visitors' Book:

As the temporary exhibition now forms our office base at Lyness, we are able to offer limited winter opening hours. If you see the lights on, do come in!

Following an unsuccessful first round, a reduced tender package focusing on the new extension and Pumphouse has recently been advertised. We are hopeful that this will enable work to start on site in the first half of 2020, whilst we continue to explore options for the renovation of the Oil Tank.

OIC PUBLIC CONSULTATION—HOY WIND FARM PROPOSALS



A public consultation drop-in session is due to be held in Hoy early in the new year to update the community on plans for a wind farm on the island.

It was announced in April that the Council planned to undertake a detailed investigation to see if land to the west of Lyness would be suitable for a substantial wind energy development.

Detailed work has been ongoing on this assessment since then, including discussions with Scottish Natural Heritage, bird and ground studies, with updated plans to be unveiled at the session.

The drop-in session takes place in the North Walls Centre community room on Tuesday 8 January 2019 between 1pm and 7pm. Staff from the Council's Strategic Projects team and local elected members, will be on hand to discuss the plans

in more detail and answer any queries local people may have.

The site the Council has been looking at lies at and to the south of Wee Fea, the hill behind Lyness which contains underground wartime oil tanks.

Council Leader James Stockan is a Councillor for Stromness and the South Isles.

He said: "Since April our Strategic Projects team has been looking at how best to take forward a major project of this kind."

"As we expected, with any wind farm development, our announcement attracted a range of views – and these have been taken into consideration when developing the plans."

"We undertook to keep the local and wider community closely involved as the project progressed and we're looking forward to heading out to Hoy to discuss revised plans with local folk."

We have had two parties in the 11 sessions – one to say goodbye to David

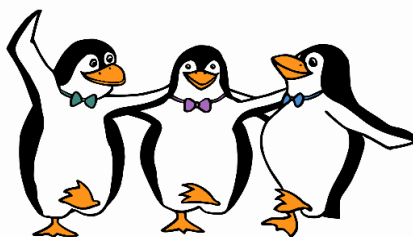

COUNCIL COMMENT— TRYING TIMES IN THE CHAMBER

Since my last contribution things have got exceedingly Political around School Place – note the ‘capital’ P as normally we work in a ‘small’ p environment – there is a huge difference!

As has been reported in the Orcadian, the Scottish Government seem reluctant to accept that Orkney and Shetland are unique in being expected to fund internal island ferries and to provide a financially acceptable level of support. On top of this they then expect us to fund additional pre school ‘education’ from a reducing grant and tie our hands by continuing to insist on maintaining unrealistic teacher numbers – in the face of a reducing school roll - and restricting how much we can generate through Council Tax.

It will be well noted on the island that OIC had a proposal to create an income generating, ‘wind farm’ scheme, but that too seems to have hit the buffers with the ‘statutory consultees’, po-

tentially too many ‘bird strikes’. As I type, the current plan is for the Strategic Project team to come out to North Walls (I think) to have a public event on the 8th of January to explain / discuss the change in thoughts – watch / listen for updates after New Year. James and Magnus are both planning to attend (I’ve Education meetings all day so can’t join you all) and will both be available to discuss any issues constituents may have, wind farms or not.

The run up to Christmas has been somewhat less than jolly and far from ‘seasons greetings to all’. However, all councillors are still battling for the best for Orkney and hopefully we still have support from the community.

Here’s to a peaceful Christmas and a prosperous, friendly 2019.

BOOST IN NUMBERS FOR HOY COMMUNITY FIRE CREW



The issue of fire service personnel shortages here on Hoy appears to have come to an end, with the local Group manager of the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, John McKenna, reporting

that Longhope fire station is now fully manned and has been equipped with an up-to-date appliance.

Staffing issues here on Hoy came to the fore at the beginning of 2017, when a fire in Lyness had to be attended by firefighters from Stromness who travelled here by ferry, due to a lack of firefighters based on Hoy.

An extensive media campaign and the availability of more locally based training courses has paid off, with the recruitment of a new person bringing the crew up to full strength. However, Mr McKenna said that the message still remains – more retained firefighters are still required.

Speaking to The Orcadian recently, Mr McKenna said that “My team and I have been on a push to recruit new applicants, not just for Hoy but for all the stations across Orkney in general. We’ve had a really good response to that. In the last few months we’ve increased numbers quite substantially across all the stations.

In particular, what was really pleasing for me was that, on Hoy, we’ve had two applicants quite recently, one of whom has got through the process. That now gives us the opportunity to have Hoy fully manned at all times, which is of great benefit to the Hoy community. Mr McKenna also said he has two more applicants set to further boost the Hoy crew after the New Year.

Asked about the challenges his team has faced in recruiting he said “We’ve had the recent addition of our BAA carbonaceous training unit at Kirkwall airport, which means we can do far more breathing apparatus training on the islands. That’s been of great benefit. We’re also able to run the task management courses, which is the initial training course for new candidates here in Orkney. That means, obviously that people don’t have to go south anymore, which I



know caused problems for people on the outer isles.

“Mr McKenna said “I’m confident we can boost numbers further and we won’t stop at the latest number of applicants – we still have space for more people on the crews and I won’t rest on my laurels until I’ve got numbers up further.

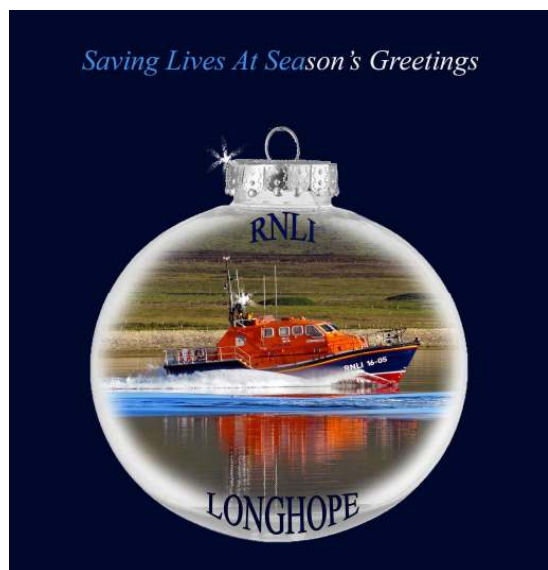

This vehicle is called a rapid response unit and it carries some of the most modern firefighting technology to date in the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service Fleet.

RNLI LONGHOPE LIFEBOAT

As you may have noticed we have a relief lifeboat *RNLI 16-10* while our boat is away south for maintenance.

4 November 2018

Lifeboat tasked to diving incident in Scapa Flow. Once again RNLI Longhope lifeboat was off to a very speedy response to the pager alert that morning at 10.12am. It was during a pre-exercise briefing that the crew were requested to launch by UK Coastguards. As they were all kitted up and ready to go, the lifeboat was underway in minutes and heading out of Longhope. They were tasked to attend a dive boat in Scapa Flow where a diver was in difficulties. However the situation was under control and the dive boat had reached Houton pier as the lifeboat arrived. In case assistance was needed, the lifeboat remained on standby until the ambulance arrived and the casualty was transferred. Sea conditions were slight and visibility good.

Coincidentally this call out was the first for recently enrolled Stella Kirkpatrick.

30 November 2018

Longhope lifeboat was just leaving Aberdeen harbour on passage to RNLI Poole in Dorset when at 8.54am, the crew were tasked by UK Coastguards to return into the harbour area. A concerned mem-

ber of the public had alerted the police that they had seen an unknown object drifting down the River Dee towards the sea. RNLI Longhope all-weather lifeboat with RNLI Aberdeen D class lifeboat and local vessels, searched the appropriate areas of the River Dee and outer harbour waters to no avail. At 9.45am the lifeboat was stood down and the search was abandoned.

Coxswain of Longhope lifeboat, Kevin Kirkpatrick said 'With all the recent heavy rain and high winds there was a fair amount of debris and logs being carried down the river which could easily have been mistaken for something more serious. Thankfully this time it was a false alarm. However it is very important for members of the public to contact the emergency services immediately if they think they have seen anything suspicious in the water or have seen anyone in difficulties along the shore. Just call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

The lifeboat then carried on with their passage to RNLI HQ at Poole where the lifeboat is due for routine maintenance checks.

RNLI Longhope would like to wish you all a safe and peaceful time over Christmas and the New Year and thank you for your continual and loyal support.

19 January: COLD WAR (15)

Paweł Pawlikowski's epic romance set against the backdrop of Europe after World War II. Sumptuously shot in luminous black and white, it spans decades and nations to tell a love story that is as tragic as it is moving, and as transportive as it is honest. In the ruins of post-war Poland, Wiktor and Zula fall deeply, obsessively and destructively in love. As performing musicians forced to play into the Soviet propaganda machine, they dream of escaping to the creative freedom of the West.

9 February: THE WIFE (15) After nearly forty years of marriage, Joan and Joe Castleman (Glenn Close and Jonathan Pryce) are complements. Where Joe is casual, Joan is elegant. Where Joe is vain, Joan is self-effacing. And where Joe enjoys his very public role as Great American Novelist, Joan pours her considerable intellect, grace, charm, and diplomacy into the private role of Great Man's Wife. *The Wife* interweaves the story of the couple's youthful passion and ambition with a portrait of a marriage, thirty-plus years later - a lifetime's shared compromises, secrets, betrayals, and mutual love.

23 February: PAPILLON (15)

Based on the international best-selling autobiographic books *Papillon* and *Banco*, the film follows the epic story of Henri "Papillon" Charrière (Charlie Hunnam), a safecracker from the Parisian underworld who is framed for murder and condemned to life in the notorious penal colony on Devil's Island. Determined to regain his freedom, Papillon forms an unlikely alliance with a convicted counterfeiter Louis Dega (Rami Malek), who in exchange for protection, agrees to finance Papillon's escape.

Gable End Film Club Programme continued**9 March: A STAR IS BORN (15)**

In this new take on the iconic love story, four-time Oscar nominee Bradley Cooper makes his directorial debut, and also stars alongside award-winning, Oscar-nominated music superstar Lady Gaga in her first leading role in a major motion picture. Cooper portrays seasoned musician Jackson Maine, who discovers and falls in love with struggling artist Ally. She has given up on her dream to become a successful singer, until she meets Jack, who immediately sees her natural talent.

23 March: PETERLOO (12A)

Mike Leigh's portrayal of the events surrounding the infamous 1819 Peterloo Massacre. Government forces charged into a crowd of over 60,000 people who had gathered in a peaceful protest against rising levels of poverty and to demand political reform. Many protesters were killed and hundreds more injured, sparking a nationwide outcry but also further government suppression. The Peterloo Massacre was a defining moment in British democracy which also played a significant role in the founding of The Guardian newspaper. Starring Maxine Peake and Rory Kinnear.

13 April: FIRST MAN (12A)

The riveting story behind the first manned mission to the moon, focusing on Neil Armstrong and the decade leading to the historic Apollo 11 flight. A visceral and intimate account told from Armstrong's perspective, the film explores the triumphs and the cost – on Armstrong, his family, his colleagues and the nation itself – of one of the most dangerous missions in history. Directed by Damien Chazelle and starring Ryan Gosling.

27 April: WIDOWS (15)

Widows is the story of four women with nothing in common except a debt left behind by their dead husbands' criminal activities. Set in contemporary Chicago, amid a time of turmoil, tensions build when Veronica (Viola Davis), Alice (Elizabeth Debicki), Linda (Michelle Rodriguez) and Belle (Cynthia Erivo) take their fate into their own hands and conspire to forge a future on their own terms.

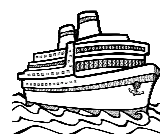
