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SCAPA FLOW MUSEUM UPDATE

The final major piece of work to ready the buildings at the Scapa Flow Museum for redevelopment, emptying the Oil Tank of its large exhibits, is now underway. The Category A-listed structure, made of riveted steel plates, dates from 1937 and will be restored as part of the redevelopment. As this involves replacing the roof of the tank and blast-cleaning and repainting the interior, the space needs to be totally emptied of objects and display equipment.

The work to shift the objects safely is being carried out under the direction of Jim Mitchell, from Argyll and Bute-based Industrial Heritage Consulting Ltd, and a team from Alloa-based JPS Restoration Ltd were recently on the island to get everything ready to move into storage.

One of the biggest and most delicate tasks was dismantling the Cantick Head lighthouse mechanism and lens, which will be stored safely in four specially-made crates, the largest with a width, depth and height of two metres. Now JPS Restoration have finished preparing the objects, they will be moved into storage elsewhere at Lyness by local contractor, Heddle Construction.

The project tender has now been advertised, with work onsite expected to begin in the Autumn.

Peter Diamond, Orkney Islands Council’s Head of Education, said: “The renovated museum and visitor centre will be a tremendous asset for Lyness, Hoy and Orkney as a whole.

“As well as being a valuable resource for visitors to our islands, it will help preserve artefacts for current and future generations that tell the remarkable story of Scapa Flow’s role as major naval base through the two world wars.”

Meantime, our temporary exhibition in the Hoy Hotel Hotel, Lyness, which has been part-funded by IoHDT, is open and attracting visitors:

THE EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES PROJECT

The Empowering Communities initiative has been developed to investigate opportunities for Community Councils to participate in the design and delivery of a number of services currently provided by Orkney Islands Council (OIC), and has been progressed in consultation with Community Councils, community groups and partnership agencies.

The majority of Orkney's Community Councils currently maintain kirkyards for OIC and this project will see Community Councils involved in shaping and delivering a range of other Council services. The type of services Community Councils could become involved in will require ongoing consultation, but could include: road maintenance; pier operations and maintenance; upkeep of core paths; airfields; refuse and recycling; transport and property maintenance.

Working in partnership with Community Councils could bring many benefits to island communities including increased employment opportunities; increased sustainability and improved access to locally-based services, the potential to develop skills within the island-based workforce in addition to introducing significant efficiencies across Council Services.

Local input could provide a new way to support and develop communities across Orkney, developing

services which are more responsive to local demand, while also creating a more efficient means of delivery for the Council.

INFORMATION FROM NHS ORKNEY

From Sunday 1st July 2018 HIAL have introduced car parking fees at Kirkwall airport. NHS patients travelling to attend an NHS appointment will be exempt from these fees. In order for patients to qualify for free parking they will have to present either their appointment card or letter (NHS Orkney travel voucher/ticket confirming their flight details will also be accepted).

- On entry to the car park patients will be issued with an entry ticket.
- On their return to Kirkwall airport patients

should go to the information desk with their entry ticket and proof of their appointment where their ticket will be validated to allow them to exit the car park free of charge.

NB: Patients must present proof of their appointment in order for their entry ticket to be validated. Should patients be unable to provide proof of their appointment at the information desk they will have to pay car parking fees before exiting the car park. Car parking fees are not reclaimable under the Highlands and Islands travel scheme.

UPDATE IOHDT SURVEY

Island of Hoy Development Trust



Way back whenok, it was March, the IoHDT circulated a survey to the island community to get feedback on life in Hoy and Walls.

We're not quite ready to undertake a community event just yet but we are planning one for the beginning of October so that we can feed back all the results from the questionnaires.

This is just the start of the consultation and the analysis required to put together an updated island development plan in collaboration with the commu-

nity, the community council and other interested agencies. It's a hard thing to please anybody or everybody but we've been reading all the comments from those who did the questionnaires and trying to work out what the island's priorities are now, and in the future.

Clearly some of the communities thoughts and wishes are beyond the abilities of the Trust alone but through collaboration and co-operation, community engagement and lobbying of external agencies we may be able to develop an updated plan to improve and enrich the life we have.

SEPA COASTAL FLOOD WARNINGS FOR ORKNEY



The Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA) and the Orkney Islands Council are launching new Coastal Flood Warnings for Orkney in September. This will add 11 new Flood Warning Areas, including Longhope and Hoy, to **Floodline**, SEPA’s flood forecasting and warning system. Once the schemes are in place, SEPA’s flood forecasters will be able to alert people in these areas when flooding is likely.

Floodline is a free service operating 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Flooding information can be accessed by anyone via the Floodline website or telephone service, but if you sign up, you will be able to receive warning messages for Longhope and Hoy direct to your landline or mobile phone. We aim to issue Coastal Flood Warning messages at least 6 hours in advance, but it can often be 12 hours or more, hopefully giving you time to prepare and take action. If you are interested in another Flood Warning Area in Orkney, such as Stromness, we can sign you up to receive messages for that location as well.

Orkney’s Coastal Flood Warnings will be launched on **18 September**. Claire and Becky

from SEPA will be at the **YM** ready to answer any of your questions about the new service and to help you sign up to Floodline. Drop in any time on the 18th between **14:30 – 19:30** for a chat and some light refreshments.

If you have any photos of flooding in Longhope or Hoy, or any flooding stories that you would be willing to share, please bring them with you. Your experiences could help us improve coastal monitoring in the area.

Certificate of Service honouring the role that her late husband Matthew Budge played as a volunteer Crew Member with Longhope lifeboat. Matthew served in the following capacities:

'ALB Crew Member 2003 to 2017 and as a relief Mechanic from 2014 to 2017. During his service at Longhope the lifeboat rescued 5 lives from shipwreck.'

Being a local farmer Matthew was often one of the first volunteers to arrive at the station when the lifeboat was called out on service. He handled his illness with great dignity and we all miss Matthew very much and hold his memory close to our hearts.

1st July Open Day

We would like to thank all the folk, both locals and visitors, who came down to the station to support us on Sunday 1 July. We had a marvellous day and an impressive **£786.18** was raised for the RNLI. The weather was kind and the ice creams melted in no time. The guild worked hard as usual supplying teas, scrumptious home bakes and cakes. **£154.05** was also taken in the lifeboat shop from the sales of souvenirs etc. Visitors were welcomed on board the lifeboat and to meet the crew.

9 July

Crew members from Longhope lifeboat were delighted to receive a cheque recently from Serco NorthLink Ferries for **£2090**. This incredible sum was raised from a staff survey which saw a donation made by Serco to the RNLI for every completed response. The ferry company annually raises funds from this survey and donates to lifeboat stations that lie within the sea area their ferries operate in. They endeavour to find a personal link between the company and the lifeboat station and in this instance the link was Lorna Heddle. Lifeboat launched to stand by cargo ship Priscilla aground on the Pentland Skerries

26 July

A successful attempt to refloat the 2280 tonne vessel MV Priscilla, that had run aground on the Pentland Skerries with six crewmembers aboard, was finally achieved. With two tugs Multratug 20 and Green Isle taking part.

The Dutch registered vessel Priscilla, carrying a cargo of fertiliser, ran aground about five nautical miles north east of Duncansby Head in the early hours of Wednesday morning 18 July. After several failed attempts to refloat it, the vessel has been stranded on the skerries until now. There appeared to be no major damage or a threat of pollution. Operations including removing a substantial amount of marine gas oil and the cargo of fertiliser, have since been underway to prepare the vessel for this attempt.

ROWING CLUB

For many years in Hoy and Walls, amongst some folk, there was talk and a dream to have a local rowing club but in November 2016 the idea became real. Thanks to a tip off from the Orkney Rowing Club, a Shetland Yoal was located at Bressay in Shetland. With funding from the Island of Hoy Development Trust the yoal was purchased and brought home. And for one night, looking like a fish out of water, it was proudly displayed on the stage of the YM hall in Longhope with a motley crew in fancy dress manning the oars.

Life jackets were bought with help from the Hoy Trust and a few days later the yoal was launched and gingerly taken for a row up the bay. I watched the progress from my garden with some amusement as the crew came to grips with the art of rowing. There were 6 oars all randomly doing their own thing, lots of 'crab catching' and a huge amount of laughter which rippled across the water and must have been heard in Flotta.

The group has come a long way since that first chaotic venture and look much more streamline and well coordinated, travelling further and faster with steadfast determination and confidence. Happily, I still hear the banter and laughter as they row by and push up the bay.

Recently the club decided they wanted a challenge and an adventure. They also needed funds to cover the cost of the yoal's care and repair. So they came up with an extraordinary and daring plan. On the day RNLI Longhope Lifeboat held their Open Day the club would do a sponsored marathon row to Moaness and back, via Lyness. They would split any money raised between the rowing club and the lifeboat.

Many an eyebrow was raised with gasps of disbelief and awe. This is a round trip of 25 miles and we all know the strength of the tides that stream around our island. The wind was fresh that morning too as they pulled away from the shelter of the pier.

Jan Witkamp who was cox for the first leg said: 'It was a rough morning at 8 am, certainly the roughest we have

been out in. We had to take a long and hard tack into the wind and waves to get to East Point on Walls and then take the waves and wind at the rear to get past the point at Crockness.'

And then they were gone from view and in the afternoon as we served tea with home bakes at the Open Day we silently worried about our rowers, particularly as there were three lifeboat guild members in the crew.

The raffle was done and the day was drawing to a close when there was a cry of: 'There they are!' We could just make them out coming around Crockness, the wind had dropped and after 8 hours hard rowing they found the strength to give it a final hard push. It was an incredible homecoming victory row and a sight to behold.

As the crew secured their worthy yoal to the pontoon you could see the utter exhaustion but that sparkle in their eyes said it all.

We are proud of you all and amazed at your marathon achievement and determination. RNLI Longhope would also like to say a massive thank you for sharing your donations with us and adding a unique and hopefully recurring event to our Open Day. Hats off and congratulations to the Hoy and Walls Rowing Club.


