In 2011, the IoHDT undertook a community survey in order to identify the priorities of the residents of Hoy and Walls and to use the resulting data to form a development plan for the island.

We know that since the last survey there has been significant change within the area, new people moving in and a number of our young folk staying and making their life here. In addition, the community now has its own bus service, the YM has been improved, the community turbine is operating well, with various groups and individuals in the community benefiting from the grants available from the output of this.

HOY AND WALLS HEALTH CENTRE

This little test could save your life: The Scottish Bowel Cancer Screening Programme

Bowel cancer is a major problem in Scotland causing many deaths each year, and most people will know someone whose family has been affected by the disease. The Scottish Bowel Cancer Screening Programme invites men and women aged between 50 and 74 to take part in screening every two years.

Bowel screening aims to find cancer at an early stage when treatment is likely to be more effective. It is the only screening programme where the test is completed at home, and is now even simpler as only one sample has to be submitted. Finding problems early is important because more than 9 out of 10 people diagnosed with stage 1 bowel cancer survive five years or more after diagnosis.

The invitations come through the post, but only 61% of people in Hoy & Walls returned a sample this year (and men were worse than women), so we're missing opportunities to pick up this potentially fatal disease early.

Have a look at the link below, pick up a leaflet from the surgery, or speak to the doctor or nurse next time you are in. You don't have to be having symptoms to benefit from this.

Aspirations and Budgets

Away from the diarised cycle of committee meetings, elected members have been discussing and debating three inter-related issues: the new Council Plan, the forthcoming budget and fairer ferry funding. Much has been said about the ferry funding in the media and the position appears secure for the coming financial year but what of the Council Plan and the Budget.

Over the past few months councillors have been 'pulling together' views and comments made to them whilst canvassing for election (those that had to!) and adding them to recurring themes from our Community Planning Partners, including Community Councils. These views and opinions have formed the 'skeleton' of the new draft Council Plan which will hopefully reflect what the public want from the council, and what councillors aspire to achieve, during this term in office. The plan has been constructed around five specific themes:

Connected Communities – specifically mentioning transport and digital connectivity

Caring Communities – centred around health and wellbeing

Thriving Communities – jobs, infrastructure, learning and leisure

Entrepreneurial Communities – the local economy

Quality of Life - specifically mentioning the small things that really matter, parking, dog fouling, recycling, waste disposal

As the draft Plan nears completion the big difficulty comes when trying to match hopes and aspirations with the finance available during the budget setting process. Although funding has been achieved for the ferries the council still has to try and reduce spend as government grants certainly don't provide enough resource

to maintain the current level of service provision across a number of sectors. Prior to setting last year's budget the council introduced the 'Budget Simulator', an online tool that enabled the public to engage with the budget setting process. The results from the 'simulator' gave councillors and officers an indication of how the public would prefer to see the Authority react during times of restricted finance. The 'Simulator' indicated that the big things to 'protect' were health care, education and transport whilst comment was made that fees and charges should be increased to help 'balance the books'. In the Plan much is made of the things that folk want to see and what contributes to the quality of life in Orkney, but when it comes to money these are very often the things that we can't afford. There are statutory services that any local authority must provide across health and education but there are also services e.g. music tuition, leisure facilities, development grants, transport grants etc. which are discretionary.

Many of these discretionary services help make Orkney the caring, vibrant community that it is yet it is precisely these services that come under scrutiny and threat during the budget process. The difficulties councillors face is compounded by the fact that since 'Tough Times, Tough Choices' era many efficiency savings have been realised and Service Departments are as lean as they can be. It won't be easy to match the fledgling Council Plan with the reality of financial restrictions. Tough decisions will have to be made, but that is what we were elected for.....

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EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES INITIATIVE

The Empowering Communities initiative has been developed to investigate opportunities for Community Councils to participate in the design and delivery of a number of services currently provided by Orkney Islands Council (OIC), and has been progressed in consultation with Community Councils, community groups and partnership agencies.

The majority of Orkney's Community Councils currently maintain kirkyards for OIC and this project will see Community Councils involved in shaping and delivering a range of other Council services. The type of services Community Councils could become involved in will require ongoing consultation, but could include: road maintenance; pier operations and maintenance; upkeep of core paths; airfields; refuse and recycling; transport and property maintenance.

Working in partnership with Community Councils could bring many benefits to island communities including increased employment opportunities; increased sustainability and improved access to locally-based services, the potential to develop skills within the island-based workforce in addi-

tion to introducing significant efficiencies across Council Services.

Local input could provide a new way to support and develop communities across Orkney, developing services which are more responsive to local demand, while also creating a more efficient means of delivery for the Council.



NORTH WALLS PARENT COUNCIL

On the third attempt [with no thanks to the weather] the Parents Council came together for the AGM, on Friday 8 February.

The initial concern was whether there would be a quorum, but it was not long before that concern was fully dispelled, and it was really good to have such a fine turnout. It was also appreciated that Graham Bevan, our School Improvement Officer, and Counsellor Thomson were both able to take time from out from their busy schedules. Their input and insight were appreciated, ensuring that the meeting was informative, and concerns were addressed.

All Office Bearers were up for re-election. And, certainly for the short term all posts were filled. Steve Rhodes agreed to be interim Chair; however with his children moving onto KGS in July [and we wish them well, and indeed to all the youngsters moving on]... he cannot continue tenure. However, Rachel Thomson has agreed to be Vice Chair, so all is looking good. Ron Bulmer was quite prepared to step down as Secretary but was re-elected. Rob Ionides admitted he could count, consequently he was elected as Treasurer; and finally Debbie Rhodes was elected, in absentia, as financial examiner. Many thanks to those folk for stepping up to the mark.

Schools are busy places, and North Walls is no exception. The Council has been very proactive in supporting School, from raising finances to introduce, and help set up the Accelerated Reading Scheme, to fund raising at the Marathon Day. Consequently, the Parent Council bank account is pretty healthy, but, this only happens because of the support and input the Community makes. This is sincerely appreciated.

Decisions now have to be made is how best the Council can support School.

Onward projects include helping to fund the P6/7 Nethybridge Outdoor residential, cleaning the hard all weather court and getting the poly tunnel finished, however, there is one area with a major appeal — help with after school activities. Badminton was very successful, and still could be, but, helpers are very much needed. It doesn't *have* to be badminton, Active Schools have a wide range of activities [and training] that are available, and will be really supportive to get things set up, and help with running. But after school activities need not be sport orientated. We may have a chess master, or, well, the many and varied other skills could be made available. So, please come and talk to School, or approach anybody from the Parents Council.

Finally, the Head teacher, Shirley Stuart, shared the School Improvement Plan. This is integral to any school's measure of performance and learning strategy, and is key to the inspection process. A central theme of the Improvement Plan is ensuring that parents are engaged and involved with their child's/children's learning and North Walls is no exception. The Parents Council is at the heart of this; but, in fact, every parent is seen as a major stakeholder in the education process, therefore, can we show our support by returning questionnaires sent out as part of this process. By completing these questionnaires you will help ensure our school continues to move forward.

RNLI LONGHOPE NEWS

Although we have had some horrendous storms travelling across Orkney this winter, thankfully, apart from a medevac in January, the lifeboat has not been called out so far this year.

However behind the scenes the crew continue to update their training and also attend weekly exercises. The lifeboat mechanics keep the boat operating correctly with maintenance and repair of associated machinery and electrical equipment, so it's ready to go at a moments notice.

On Sunday 4 February Longhope lifeboat was very pleased and honoured to accept a cheque for £700.00 from members of The Highland Park Appreciation Society.



It has been decided to use this generous donation to purchase and install a defibrillator which will be positioned on the wall of the lifeboat station. As this is one of the busiest places in Longhope, with folk coming down to the shop and people using the pier, the defibrillator will be readily available for any members of the public to use if needed. We have great support from our local community and visitors and we hope this equipment will benefit the whole community. It is planned to give a demonstration on how to use this essential livesaving equipment at the Lifeboat Open Day on 1 July 2018.

The film produced by the German film company 360°Geo Reportage about the Longhope Lifeboat will be available on Arte TV. This European culture TV channel is free and on demand. You can find it by typing in Arte into Google search. The film will be shown on February 11 at 6.30pm and will be available for some time.

HOY STOAT UPDATE

The programme to protect Hoy's native wildlife by removing any stoats from Hoy and determining how widespread they are has been running for a couple of months now and I know people are keen for an update on the results.

As part of the incursion response to the confirmed stoat sighting in November from a trail camera (put out following two reported sightings in October), RSPB Scotland employed two research assistants John Tayton and Alex Cropper. Their notes have gone into this summary of the story so far.



John and Alex have been busy, battling through snowy conditions, moving and adding to the network of traps and trail cameras designed to rid the island of these non-native predators and assess the scale of

the problem. John and Alex have checked 72 traps each week and although several rats were caught each week, there have been no stoats or stoat signs in the traps.

There are also 41 movement-sensing trail cameras set up around the island. Other than the original stoat captured on film in November last year, there have been no further stoats seen on camera. However, John and Alex have been in-

terested to see the various animals and birds the cameras have spotted. Alex said "I have enjoyed looking through all the camera footage and we have been rewarded with some great views of local wildlife including otters, hen harriers, mice, herons and more!"



John left in January to work on the Shiants, but Alex is with us for another month to help us understand how widespread the stoats are on the island and help develop plans to stop them spreading. If you suspect you have spotted a stoat please get in touch with Alex immediately on Alex.Cropper@rspb.org.uk or telephone 07545 507718.


