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A BROADBAND SOLUTION?

At the last Community Council meeting, a company called CloudNet IT Solutions made a presentation with regards to providing a better broadband solution for people in Hoy and Walls. As a follow up, THE BLETHER® asked them to provide some further information. See below for details:

CloudNet IT Solutions are a Wireless Internet Service Provider (WISP) that provides a range of broadband services to customers. We specialise in the provision of broadband networks and services into difficult and hard to reach areas, where traditional broadband services fail to deliver.

CloudNet have been working with the Scottish Future Trust and Strathclyde University, Centre for TV White Space to develop TV White Space technology which focuses on delivering broadband services to rural premises and over water for marine use. Our network infrastructure is being built around Orkney which we now want to utilise by providing broadband to homes and businesses that either have no or very limited broadband connection.

Currently we would be able to provide this service to some areas of Hoy, however to cover more of the island we do need to look at procuring either a small piece of land for a small mast or high buildings/byre which could have wireless equipment installed onto it to allow us to deliver broadband into hard to reach areas.

We would be very interested in assisting the Rackwick community in delivering broadband to this area. However, would there be interest from the Hoy community to do so, or would the Island of Hoy Development Trust be amenable to assisting us to provide a solution? We would ideally need to discuss with land owners a proposal, and include RSPB, SNH or whosoever has a personal stake or land through to Rackwick. We would see this as an opportunity for this to be delivered as part of the community broadband roll out, but would like to look at the feasibility in doing so.

We are BDUK (Broadband Delivery UK) approved and registered installers. The Government's Department for Culture, Media and Sport have invested money in order to help people who have a poor

broadband service pay to get their local WISP company to install and supply an improved service. This means that the cost of the install is covered by BDUK, and requires each household to register with them. This would cover the cost of the equipment, cable, router and associated components and you would only have to pay a monthly charge from one of our packages below.

We have 2 packages available at present.

Home (Light Usage) - 10Mbps - Up to 100GB - £25.00p/m inc VAT Home/Small

Business - 10Mbps - Unlimited - £30.00p/m inc VAT

If you are interested we would like to know first and foremost your address and postcode, this will help us carry out a site scope to identify whether we can provide you with broadband at the moment or whether you live in an area which we need to install our network.

If there was a Community Liaison who we could work with CloudNet to collate any broadband interests and work with us to coordinate assisting customers to register with BDUK this would be beneficial.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS—BUT NOT FOR HOY AND WALLS

As all will be aware by now, at the close of nominations for candidates for the local council elections, the Stromness and South Isles ward was uncontested. As such no vote will take place and the three candidates who stood for election – Rob Crichton, James Stockan and Magnus Thomson – will be declared as Councillors on 4 May.

Below, Rob Crichton looks to the future and outlines his hopes and aspirations for the ward in the next term of the council.

In subsequent issues of THE BLETHER® we'll hear from James Stockan and Magnus Thomson and find out what they are hoping to progress for Hoy and Walls.

Looking Forward

I think it's fair to say that all three of the incoming Stromness and South Isles councillors greeted the news that there was to be no election in the ward with mixed emotions. It is always good to get out and about amongst the electorate and we were all looking forward to some interesting hustings. April, however, has been more relaxed!

What are my hopes and aspirations for the ward, and particularly Hoy and Walls, in the coming five years?

In the last term Stromness benefitted from a considerable amount of 'regeneration' and there has been a lot of talk about the same for Lyness, both commercially, with the DSM decommissioning proposal and the renewed interest in the underground tanks, and culturally, with the proposals for the museum. Hopefully momentum will start to gather with these projects and I'd plan to support them as best as I can as they make their way through council. Sustainability of island and rural communities relies on employment and housing. If we can see business locating in Hoy and Walls then we've a chance of seeing housing development as well.

Another interesting project that has been ongoing in the last Council was the Empowering Communities pilot. This scheme saw Papa Westray and Stronsay charged with developing their own, island based, support functions and removing many tasks from School Place. The pilot has been deemed to be a success and there

is a proposal to roll it out to two other communities. I am making a plea that Hoy and Walls be considered.

Having regularly attended Community Council meetings I am acutely aware that many tasks undertaken on behalf of the Council could be progressed more quickly, and probably more efficiently, if organised on the island. Any change may be tricky to start with but, if handled correctly, there is an opportunity to create some island based jobs – even if they are only part time initially - and in the long term I can only see benefit for both the community and the Authority.

With these types of developments on the horizon it is vital that the status of the North Walls Junior Secondary remains as it is – i.e. moth-balled but not closed – and I will be arguing hard again if any change is suggested. It is also important that pressure is kept on the council to consider traffic calming measures at the school, hopefully in the not too distant future.

Although these are a few of my 'hot topics' going forward I'm sure James and Magnus would echo my belief that councillors are elected to represent their constituents and if there are any issues that need to be addressed in Hoy and Walls, *please get in touch* – we'll endeavour to publish full contact details in the next issue of THE BLETHER® (won't be confirmed until after the 4th May).

RNLI LONGHOPE LIFEBOAT STATION

Shout 2nd March

On March 2 2017, Longhope lifeboat was paged at 13.14 by UK Coastguard and requested to assist Kirkwall lifeboat which was involved with a rescue of a disabled fishing vessel.

Longhope lifeboat finally arrived on scene some two hours after leaving station. Although Kirkwall lifeboat had established a tow with the fishing boat, Longhope lifeboat stood by on the long arduous tow back to Kirkwall.



The 35m Fraserburgh registered fishing boat *Sunrise* with six crew aboard was about 40 miles east of Orkney. It was unable to make way when net became entangled in its propeller.

Sea conditions were rough with a 3m swell but visibility was good. Deputy Coxwain Angus Budge said: 'It was an extremely long day for Kirkwall lifeboat in unpleasant conditions. We were glad to cooperate with them and offer our support.'

The lifeboat was back at station at 22.40, refuelled and ready for service.

Shout 6th March

Longhope lifeboat was requested to launch on the night of 6 March 2017 by UK Coastguard and to attend MV Karin, a 23m dive vessel with three crew on board. It had suffered engine failure in the Pentland Firth and was drifting east of Stroma. The lifeboat located the vessel that was drifting without power or lights and established a tow.

Sea conditions were moderate as they made their way back to Orkney. During the tow the crew of MV Karin managed to restart the engines and proceed independently. The tow was released and the lifeboat escorted the boat back to the more sheltered waters of Scapa Flow. MV Karin continued to Stromness and the lifeboat returned to station and was ready again for service at 22.25.

WILDFIRES AND SCOTTISH ACCESS CODE

This is a bit of a public information page this issue. We've been asked to remind folk (although its probably more relevant to those visiting) about the Scottish access code particularly with regards to dogs and also to highlight the Scottish Fire Services leaflet on Wildfires and Muir burning.

Wildfires

Wildfires are dangerous, spreading fast, changing direction, threatening wildlife, livestock and domestic animals, environment, property and people.

"Livestock, farmland, wildlife, protected woodland and sites of special scientific interest can all be devastated by these fires, as can the lives of people living and working in rural communities.

"Human behaviour can significantly lower the chance of a wildfire starting so it's crucial people act safely and responsibly in rural environments and follow the countryside code." The public can help prevent wildfires by making sure they dispose of litter and smoking materials carefully while in rural areas. There are a number of things land managers can do to help prevent wildfires, including strict adherence to the Muirburn Code, which applies to the controlled burning of moorland within the permitted season. After 15 April no burning is allowed

below 450m (1500 feet) and any burning above this level must be done with the landowners permission.

Scottish Access Code

Access rights apply to people walking dogs as long as their dogs are kept under proper control. Your main responsibilities are:

Farm animals:

- Never let your dog worry or attack farm animals.
- Don't take your dog into fields where there are lambs, calves or other young farm animals.
- If you go into a field of farm animals, keep your dog(s) on a short lead or under close control and keep as far as possible from the animals.

Ground nesting birds:

- During the breeding season (usually April-July) keep your dog on a short lead or close at heel in areas such as moorland, forests, grasslands, loch shores and the sea shore to avoid disturbing birds that nest on or near the ground.


