Voles and Vessels



Tuesday, 16th August saw members of Orkney Rowing Club (ORC) setting off from Brims to paddle across the Firth in a replica Neolithic boat. The five members of ORC were joined by one of the boat builders, Jeff Mackie, a BBC presenter and a producer, who were in Orkney filming for a three part series, Operation Orkney, about Neolithic Orkney to be broadcast in the autumn. The boat, constructed by local Orkney craftsmen, was made of willow, which formed a frame, with a cow hide stretched around it.

The purpose of the exercise was to examine how people managed to travel between Orkney and the Scottish mainland given the rapidity of the tidal currents in the Pentland Firth and the dangerous eddies/whirlpools. Fortunately for the team from ORC, the weather was grand and they reached the shore below the Castle of Mey, Caithness, in just under five hours.



Also in the county, filming for the same series, was well-known wildlife presenter Chris Packham. He met up with Keith Dobney from Loft, South Walls, to talk about the origin of the Orkney vole, remains of which have been found on many of the archaeological sites in

Orkney. The work done by Keith and his colleagues has shown these intrepid time travellers were introduced to these isles by the early farmers who arrived here some five thousand years ago in boats. Although not quite Jurassic Park, by extracting DNa from ancient and modern vole bones, this research points to the northern coast of Belgium as the origin of the Orkney vole. Were they introduced deliberately by the first farmers to arrive or did they hitch a lift in the fodder of domestic livestock also brought here as part of the new farming culture? Whatever the answer, they represent a unique species that occurs nowhere else in the British Isles.

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SCAPA FLOW VISITOR CENTRE AND MUSEUM LOOKS TO THE FUTURE

With a few weeks still to go of our peak summer season we're having one of our busiest years so far, with well over 11,000 visitors expected by the end of August. Keeping the site going in tandem with planning for the future has been challenging at times, but just because we have been quiet for a while about our planned refurbishment project at the museum doesn't mean that nothing has been happening!

With funding already in place from Orkney Islands Council, Historic Environment Scotland and Highlands and Islands Enterprise, work is steadily progressing on our Stage 2 Heritage Lottery Funding application, which we hope to submit in December of this year.

We are very pleased that LDN Architects and Pick Everard have been appointed on the design and structural engineering side of the project, whilst the new exhibition will be designed by Studio MB. All have an excellent track record – LDN Architects designed the Museum of Liverpool, whilst Studio MB redesigned displays for The Museum of the Black Watch and the Titanic Galleries in Belfast – so we're confident we've got an excellent team in place.

We've had a series of very positive site meetings and as we go to press are looking in detail at their design and build ideas. So far the plans are looking very exciting and take a creative approach to ensuring the site is coherent and works well as an overall space. The proposals for the refurbishment of the existing historic buildings are light touch and sensitive and will retain the authentic feel whilst providing a more artefact-friendly environment.

A lot of work has also been going on behind the scenes on all the other parts of the jigsaw that make up a Heritage Lottery Fund application. Community consultation and engagement is an important piece of this and as soon as we have a stronger idea of the building and exhibition design ideas we will be back in touch to gather feedback and ideas and to invite your participation. We want to make sure that the stories we tell reflect the reality of life on Hoy, and in Orkney, from WW1 to the present day, telling local, human stories alongside the 'official' wartime story. More details will follow shortly, so watch this space.

War Memorial Update

The Community Council appreciate the Community's patience whilst the task of securing funding and identifying a suitable contractor for the repair of the Longhope War Memorial was ongoing.

The repairs undertaken by Graciela Ainsworth involved a detailed inspection and then the removal of the cross. Once free of the base, it was clear that the dowels holding the two parts of the monument together were corroded. These were removed and replaced by longer, thicker stainless steel rods. The old cement was also removed and a bed of lime mortar was put between the two sections. Metal staining and organic growth on the sections was cleaned off or lessened.

The Community Council would like to thank Eric and Luke from Graciela Ainsworth, Edinburgh, and Heddle Cranes, for the professional job they did in completing repairs to the Memorial.

COUNCIL COMMENT—POLICE AND FIRE BOARD



As part of my council duties, I am one of eight councillors who sit on the Police and Fire Board, the local scrutiny committee set up to monitor the performance of Police Scotland and the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service at a local level. Purely by chance, although now ratified as a must, all six council wards are represented on the Board allowing for scrutiny down to a very local level. Since the two new 'parent' bodies were set up, it has been a fairly trying time as we all try to adapt to life away from 'The Highlands and Islands' grouping to the more national framework, and the Board has struggled with how to get meaningful information and statistics to scrutinise.

Both services have included council ward members in the formation of their 'local plans', with Police Scotland in particular engaging with Community Council as well to draw up local policing priorities. It came as no surprise that locally, the public's priorities were to reduce alcohol related offences and have a higher profile against road traffic offences. We are very lucky in Orkney to have low incident rates for what can perhaps be described as 'hard crimes' and, from a statistical point of view, any occurrence of such an incident can result in a 50% (or more) swing in statistics!

The same is true for Scottish Fire and Rescue Service statistics, with the particular bug bear for the Board being the high level of 'false alarm' call-outs from fire alarms. The SFRS, understandably, have to react to fire alarm callouts and it is perhaps indicative of the good coverage of the tele care system, which is certainly not infallible, that we have a statistical issue. The local service is working hard to reduce the number of false alarms by visiting

households and trying to ensure that any detectors are placed appropriately and not likely to be affected by cooking, fire cleaning or normal domestic activities.

Away from the scrutinising aspect of our responsibilities, Board members have been grappling with the issue of retained fire fighter numbers in Orkney and in particular the isles. We have been actively encouraging senior officers at local and national level to appreciate that 'one cap doesn't fit all' and to look at different ways of doing things in a rural context.

It was pleasing to note that the last recruitment drive didn't stipulate that applicants had to reside at any particular distance from the station and used the word 'appropriate' when discussing fire fighter response times. The local road network generally means that isles fire fighters, staying any distance from the station, will take longer (keeping safe and legal) to get to their station than mainland based fighters. It's acknowledged however, that it's better to have a local response, albeit slightly slower, than relying on a mainland based tender to get to the isles to react to an incident!

The next strand in trying to retain, or attract, isle fire fighters is to develop an Orkney training facility. Several isle Community Councils, including Graemsay, Hoy and Walls, have got involved in the debate and Liam MacArthur has had a number of high level meetings to try and encourage the Scottish Government to fund a facility at the airport, much like that currently enjoyed by Shetland and the Western Isles. In the current economic climate things won't happen overnight, but we'll keep pushing!

NEWS FROM RNLI LONGHOPE

<u>02/08/2016:</u> Longhope Lifeboat was requested to launch at 08.22 by Shetland Coastguard.

The Coastguard and two local fishermen had been alerted by a mayday call but no following communications were heard.

Longhope lifeboat carried out a coastal search along the east side of Scapa Flow from Herston to Ham then continued the search around Flotta and to the east of Fara. Stromness lifeboat was also launched and involved in the search. Sea conditions and visibility were good.

No vessels in distress were found and the lifeboats returned to station. Longhope lifeboat was refuelled and ready again for service at 10.50.

<u>09/07/2016</u>: A BBC film crew and presenter joined Longhope lifeboat on their weekly training exercise. Heading out into the Pentland Firth the film crew were particularly interested to see some of the notorious tidal currents that exist in these waters.

The BBC is in the process of creating a three part series about prehistoric Orkney with reference to the archaeology, environment and wildlife.

Part of this project involved the reconstruction of a Neolithic boat which was eventually rowed across the Pentland Firth. To prepare for this journey the BBC joined Longhope lifeboat to discuss with the lifeboat crew members the tidal currents and seafaring challenges that the crew of the reconstructed boat may have to deal with.



Lifeboat Coxswain, Kevin Kirkpatrick and Deputy Coxswains, Angus and Kenny Budge also advised them on the power of the water, speed of the tides, particular aspects of different currents and the pros and cons of various routes to take, in order to reach Scotland.

This was a serious and possibly dangerous venture which the RNLI did not endorse. However Longhope lifeboat crew members also offered advice on how to stay safe and what to do if they get into trouble and above all to Respect the Water.

It was great to meet the film crew, Jamie and Tom and the awesome presenter Shini Somara and we wished them a safe and successful crossing in their prehistoric vessel. Rest assured Longhope lifeboat and the volunteer crew were on standby at any time, day or night.
