## THE EAGLES ARE BACK!



The white-tailed eagles have been keeping everyone guessing over the past year, but we are delighted to share that they are once again soaring over the Hoy hills. Following a disappointing Spring last year when the Hoy pair of white-tailed eagles abandoned their territory, hope was re-kindled when three birds appeared around Ward Hill in May 2017.

The differences in feather colours allow us to work out roughly how old the birds are, so we know that the new pair are an adult female

(six+ years old and possibly one of the original Hoy pair) and a younger male and there is also a three year old bird that is often seen around the island.

The eagles have been seen regularly over the winter and we have been hoping for signs that the new pair would settle above the Dwarfie Stone. The birds got off to a promising start and have been busy building their nest and we were thrilled when they settled down there. I will update soon when we have more news, or pop by and see for yourself.

RSPB staff/ volunteers aim to be at the Dwarfie Stone car park every day between 11am and 3pm to help people spot any pass-

ing eagles and offer suggestions on the wildlife to watch out for each day.

It has been a 'roller coaster ride' to watch the pair decide if they would settle on the cliffs this spring, but it is wonderful to see them perched on the crags again. ### IOHDT FUNDING SUPPORT FOR SCAPA FLOW MUSEUM

The redevelopment of the Scapa Flow Museum at Lyness involves the restoration of the historic buildings, the enhancement of interpretation and displays, and the creation of a new building which will house an exhibition space, café, toilet facilities and information areas.

The museum is currently closed and not projected to re-open until March 2020. With recent visitor numbers standing at 14,000 a year the museum is keen to continue to attract visitors to the island and will shortly be opening a temporary exhibition in part of the Hoy Hotel at Lyness, which will run throughout the 2018 and 2019 seasons.

We are delighted to have received a grant of £10,161 from IoHDT towards new interpretation and equipment for this, which will ensure that the exhibition will be comprehensive and engaging enough to warrant a special trip to Hoy, or to factor in as one of the attractions that make a visit to the island worthwhile.

Whilst there won't be any objects on show, the grant will enable us to present digital information for the first time. As a gateway site, the museum has always promoted other island attractions, businesses and services, and sees this as an important part of its role.

One of the new touchscreen computers funded by IoHDT will give visitors access to the www.hoyorkney.com website, which as well as having a comprehensive section on the wartime heritage of Hoy contains information about all that the island has to offer, helping visitors to make the most of their stay on Hoy.

Others will allow access to digital information that complements the exhibition panels, show-cases recent research and will enable visitors to take a 360° tour of the museum site and former displays.

Once the museum reopens, the equipment will be put to good use in the new temporary exhibition and education space.

The museum has also recently been awarded £15,000 from Museums Galleries Scotland. This will be used to purchase specialist audio-visual equipment and commission a film which will help tell the story of Scapa Flow and Orkney's role in the two world wars, forming a major new exhibit in the WW2 Oil Tank when restoration is complete.

These two new grants join funding of up to £1.155 million from the Heritage Lottery Fund. Funding has also been received from Historic Environment Scotland, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, the LEADER programme and Orkney Islands Council.

#### Community Resilience meeting

The first meeting of the Community Resilience Group took place at North Walls Centre on Wednesday 16 May. It was attended by local Community Councillors, Emergency Services Representatives, Development Trust representative, Dr Cromarty, Les Donaldson—Civil Contingencies Officer, Orkney Islands Council, and Pamela Harvey, Customer Relationship Manager for Scottish and Southern Energy.

The aim of the group is to look at ways to prepare for emergencies that could arise on the island and to put in place contingency plans should the need arise. More details will be forthcoming in the coming months.

#### Bag the Bruck

Graemsay, Hoy and Walls Community Council would like to thank all of the groups and individuals who took part in Bag the Bruck this year. The groups who took part were as follows:

Graemsay Community Association collected a total of 11 x 1 tonne bags from the beaches around Graemsay.

A collection organised by Lee for the RSPB collected 100+ bags at Rackwick, plus larger items.

Longhope Lifeboat Guild members collected 31 bags plus some big bits from around the Lifeboat Station, the Ayre, Back Shore and Brims area.

North Walls School teachers, support staff and children collected 10 Bags plus some big bits from the Ouse

Parents and Children from the North Walls Parent Council collected 25 bags and some big stuff from the Ayre and the back shore .

The Haey Hope Club collected 8 bags from North Ness and Ouse.

The Youth Club did a final collection at Creekland Bay on Thursday 24 May.

The Community Council will be making a donation to all of the groups that have taken part.

Although it is sad that there is so much bruck around and about our lovely islands, it is amazing the amount of folk that have taken part this year and helped to keep our islands as beautiful as ever. ## COUNCIL COMMENT

#### **Budget and Boats**

In my February article I commented on the OIC's budget setting process, little did I know how much it would be scrutinised and feature heavily in the local press for as long as it has done. Since first becoming a Councillor in 2007 setting the annual budget has always been a trying time and I have attempted to tackle the process with an open and fair mind. 2018 was no different although, due to the efficiencies made in previous years, harder, as 'front line services' were to be affected.

Setting aside my own personal belief that OIC should be using the Reserve Fund to a greater level to 'prop up' the budget, and accepting that we were in delicate negotiations with the Scottish Government regarding the funding of our internal ferry services, I felt that elected members had come to some difficult decisions that could be justified to the general public. How wrong was I!

In the past three weeks we've seen the budgetary 'cut' to the Support for Learning Assistants overturned (rightly so as a review of the service is currently underway and a restructuring may well provide the efficiencies anyway), the reduction in service provision by Dial-A-Bus questioned and users free entitlement changed from 1 to 3 as well as several columns in the Orcadian dedicated to 'gossip' regarding St Colms and the warden service at Raes Close in Stromness and Lambaness in Kirkwall. The media are having a field day and elected members, particularly those new to the job, are feeling a bit under the cosh. Where do we go from here?

The fact is that we are in difficult financial times and OIC has recognised that we need to discuss with the general public what our next steps are. To that end there is a plan to stage a 'Tough Times, Tough Choices II' tour to gather as much information and public views as we can ahead of setting the 2019/20 budget. Early engagement and advanced communication may well counter the type of reaction that has occurred recently. OIC intend to visit **all** island groups and mainland parishes (a tough stint by any stretch of the imagination) so watch out for when the South Isles are due for a visit and get along and contribute, your opinion will be considered – though none of us ever get everything that we want!

As far as ferries go, the funding granted last year wasn't committed as a 'base line' addition to the grant Orkney gets and there certainly hasn't been any movement in our ask that the Scottish Government takes on full responsibility for the ferries i.e. provision of new boats as well as funding the running cost of providing the service. Until we get an assurance from Holyrood that we are financially secure in that regard there will always be a 'cloud' over our budget setting process.

Although I'd personally love to see OIC balance its budget using the Reserve Fund and avoiding any cuts or efficiency savings, I fully appreciate that that would send the wrong message to the Scottish Government. We perhaps have to face some reductions to some services going forward to reach the bigger goal of a fully funded inter island ferry service – something to discuss when you're given the opportunity.

Jayne Traynor and Fay Clark were presented with these special awards at our AGM meeting by John Budge, the Longhope Lifeboat Operations Manager. Also a very special welcome and thank you to our new guild members.



#### 16-21 April 2018

Longhope Lifeboat Museum were at the Blue Door charity shop and managed to raise £3582.78. The Museum Trust would like to thank everyone who helped in any way to make this such a success.

#### 7 April 2018

We were pleased to welcome James Manson and his wife Liz, to the Longhope Lifeboat Museum. James is the nephew of the late Jimmy Swanson, who lost his life along with all his fellow crew members on the Longhope lifeboat T.G.B. in the tragic disaster of 1969

During Jimmy's time on the lifeboat his courage and conduct was recognised by the RNLI and he was awarded various vellums (certificates) and medals. It was his ninety year old sister's wish that these precious awards be returned to his homeland and be donated to the lifeboat museum at Brims. Kindly, her son James and his wife brought the awards back to Brims and presented them to our Coxswain Kevin Kirkpatrick and Geordie Taylor DLA.

We would like to thank James for bringing the awards home and a very special thank you to Jimmy's sister



for passing them on and entrusting the museum with them. We greatly appreciate the gesture and we will treasure them dearly.

#### 18 March 2018

Longhope lifeboat carried out an exercise with the Flotta passenger launch Herston Lass.

The scenario was that the Herston Lass had suffered complete engine failure resulting in the vessel being disabled. To complicate matters one of the three crew aboard had fallen and broken his leg. On arriving at scene and alongside, two lifeboat crew members with medical equipment boarded the Herston Lass to conduct a medical assessment, stabilise the casualty and secure on stretcher. The lifeboat then established a tow and the launch was towed out of danger. Once the two vessels were safely alongside each other the casualty was then transferred to the lifeboat.

The second half of the exercise involved both vessels carrying out a man over board recovery.

This exercise went very well, an important practice of these medical and rescue procedures and was a valuable training experience for the newer crew members aboard the lifeboat.

#### 17 March 2018

At 18.47pm Longhope lifeboat crew responded to a paged request to launch from UK Coastguard. Seven minutes later the lifeboat had left it's station and was heading up the bay. An elderly person had been reported missing in St. Margaret's Hope and the lifeboat was to search the maritime area along with the local coastguards and police. As the lifeboat approached the search area they were stood down, the casualty having been found. Sea conditions were good but bitterly cold. The lifeboat arrived back at station by 19.40 and made ready again for service.

## RNI.I LONGHOPE NEWS CONTINUED

#### 9 March 2018

RNLI Longhope lifeboat was launched on service today at 10.33am. It was requested by UK Coast-guards to attend a vessel in distress in Mill Bay, just north of Lyness.

A local 23ft creel boat with one occupant aboard, had a fouled propeller from a mooring line and was stuck fast.

The lifeboat arrived on scene at10.47am and proceeded to free the vessel. This proved to be a quite a task with the rising tide causing the rope to become extremely tight. It was decided to launch the Y boat from the lifeboat so two crew members had easier access to the propeller. However it was necessary for one crew member to enter the water in order to cut the the rope. Thankfully conditions were good and visibility clear.

Once the mooring line was cut the lifeboat established a tow and the vessel was brought safely home

to Longhope. They arrived back at station at 12.25pm and the lifeboat was made ready again for service.

#### The Job:

Based entirely at the Museum the successful applicant will work Mondays to Friday for five hours each day, keeping the building open to visitors from 11.00 hrs to 16.00hrs from the earliest start date until 28th September. Some Sunday work may be available by arrangement. The post will be paid monthly at £10 per hour, less tax and NI deductions as appropriate.

#### **Duties:**

Keeping the Museum open for visitors is only one important requirement of the job. The Custodian will be expected to learn the basic history of the Longhope Lifeboat in order to present a professional impression and to be able to answer questions that visitors may have.

It is essential that the museum is kept clean and tidy, so some basic caretaking and maintenance duties will be necessary.

The museum was intended for a specific pur-

pose and there may be hazards that some visitors will need to be made aware of, issues that call for understanding and some diplomacy. The Custodian must be able to identify these instances and react accordingly.

Because of the position of the Longhope Lifeboat Museum, there may be times when visitors are few. To make the best of these periods, it is expected that the Custodian will take on some archiving tasks as directed by the Trustees when appropriate.

### HOY SOUND AT ST MAGNUS CATHEDRAL



Hoy Sound joined with our good friends Orkney Camerata for a lunchtime concert at St Magnus Cathedral in Kirkwall on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> May.

## A few words from visiting composer & musical director Laurence Rugg:

This was the eleventh year I have been to Orkney to work with Hoy Sound. My original visit to provide a workshop for singers from Cornwall joining up with Hoy singers has turned into a long and creative relationship. Long may it last!

Last September Orkney Camerata joined Hoy Sound to give a concert in Hoy Kirk. The choir put in a lot of work to make this succeed and they jumped at the idea of repeating this concert in St. Magnus Cathedral. This was not all, as they also sang recently for an evening of poetry and song, again in Hoy Kirk, supported by The George Mackay Brown Fellowship.

The lunchtime concert in the Cathedral was well attended. It gave many in Hoy Sound their first opportunity to sing in this venue. This was not without its challenges as the acoustic demands that singers follow the conductor rather than their ears! I was delighted by their devoted performance, with the Camerata, of my settings of two George Mackay Brown poems, Peat Cutting and Eynhallow.

Andy Fellows conducted 'Never Weather Beaten Saile' by Thomas Campion and an arrangement of the Rousay Lullaby and was able to demonstrate just how much work he has put into developing the choir since coming to live on Hoy. May his work with them continue.

The concert was interspersed with pieces played by the Camerata. These included the, ever-popular, "Shepherd's Hey" by Percy Grainger and a movement from Albinoni's oboe concerto, with the solo oboe beautifully played by Yvonne Gray.

I first came across Yvonne's poetry in an anthology of Scottish verse. After contacting and meeting her she wrote some poems for me to put to music. They were specifically about Hoy. These poems were the finale of the concert. They included "May Morris at Melsetter" inspired by a photo of May Morris spinning in the court-yard at Melsetter. May Morris was the daughter of William Morris, chief inspiration of the Art and Craft Movement. Yvonne played the oboe for this and Andy played the piano. The piano part was written to evoke the movement of the spinning wheel.

My other settings of Yvonne's poems were "Four Shore Stones", "Cragsman", "Imprint" and "White-tailed Sea Eagle". In singing these pieces the choir gave of their best and sang so clearly that the words came across very well. For me, portraying the words in the music is central. Yvonne's words have a thoughtfulness about them which draws attention to their evocative nature and musicality, which is, in turn, a gift to set to music.

There is one poem of Yvonne's left for me to set – Travellers. As I write I am able not only to enjoy Yvonne's words and what they bring out in me, but also to think of each individual in Hoy Sound, who they are and how they are going to respond both to the words and the music. The creative relationship feels strong. Writing for friends such as those in Hoy Sound makes the relationship stronger. The pull to Orkney, and Hoy especially, strengthens.


